Translational Malaria Research

We invite applications from outstanding young scientists to establish an independent research group on translational malaria research, preferably with a focus on drug or vaccine development or vector control. The candidate should have 2 - 6 years of postdoctoral training and an outstanding track record of accomplishments. The position will be funded by the "Deutsche Zentrum für Infektionsforschung" (DZIF; http://www.dzif.de/) for 5 years starting 1 January 2016 and includes funding for personnel and consumables. The group will be located at the Centre for Infectious Diseases, Parasitology, at Heidelberg University Hospital. Adequately furbished laboratories, including access to animal facilities, safety compartments, insectary, and state-of-the-art imaging and technology platforms, are available. The acquisition of additional extra-mural funding is expected.

International applications are welcome. Salary and social benefits will be in accordance with the German labor laws.

Applications, which should include a CV, a complete list of publications, copies of 5 selected publications, other records of major achievements, a 5-page research proposal and two letters of recommendation, should be submitted to the e-mail address listed below before 30 June 2015. Shortlisted candidates will be invited to Heidelberg for an interview during August/September.
